11th Conference of Youth 2015

he 11th Conference of Youth (COY11) was held at Parc des Exposition in Paris and included talks on multidimesional change. It aimed at going further into the understanding of the climate negotiation process and at reinforcing the capacity for youth action in the field. More than two thousand young people gathered from all over the world from 26-28 November at COY11 with the sole purpose of finding concrete solutions to climate change through discussions, workshops and training. It was a youth mobilization event held prior to COP 21 which was organized by and for all young people who want to voice their views. COY"s have preceded the Conference of the Parties since 2005 giving the message that today"s young people are prepared to act for a more sustainable and desirable society. In 2009, young people obtained a special status as the secretary of the UNFCCC recognized youth as a real group giving them a status to not only to strengthen their presence within the negotiations, but also to take part in it in the same way as other stakeholders. It served as a critical platform to address the voice of young people on climate change, which requires unprecedented international, national and local efforts.

The slogans "Nothing about us, without us" and "Make it real" were echoing as 26th November began in Paris, where the youth of all nationalities lined up in order to participate. The security barriers were strict due to the recent terror attack but a warm and inspiring atmosphere followed once we passed them. The huge space, ornamented with wooden furniture made from recycled craft, the zero waste drive and grass was peacefully invaded by the intellect of the passionate participants. The whole conference was based around the necessity for a multidisciplinary approach to the global concerns through four areas of introspection, inspiration, training and production. There were several parallel sessions organized offering the attendees the chance to approach a great variety of themes, from environmental justice to food security. I had the opportunity to meet high level speakers including the special envoy of the UN, Ahmad Alhendawi, President of COP21 and French Foreign Minister, Laurent Fabius, the founder of the NGO antiwhaling Sea Shepard, Paul Watson, the spiritual Buddhist leader, Sulak Sivaraksa, and spokesman of the UNFCCC, Nick Nuttall. Ahmad Alhendawi said "There are almost two thousand young people here today from all over the world sending a very positive message of solidarity. This message shows that we are never defeated from terrorism and we are not yet in power but we have most power."

The Manifesto served as a lobbying and engagement tool for youth groups with sets of recommendations and actions which did not limit it to themes related to COP21 but covered aspects related to climate change as considered important by the youth. It was an intriguing event which led to creative endeavors that I along with my team members, spread globally, worked on after taking into account the voices of vulnerable individuals and communities, including women, children, minorities, and indigenous peoples, through effective participation processes. When we speak about climate change, we tend to see its impacts on environment, biodiversity and atmosphere but we often neglect its human dimension. In this sense, climate change may affect a

broad range of human rights: the right to life, the right to food, the right to work, the right to health, the right to access clean water, the right to breath fresh air, the right to shelter and housing, the right to development, the right to security, the right to a healthy environment, the right to land, the right to education, as well as cultural and indigenous people"s rights. More than 250 citizens from 55 different countries were divided in several working groups this. Laurent Fabius was impressed by the creativity, energy and ingenuity of the Manifesto and assured it will be included in the final agreement of COP21. I am humbled to be a part of COP21 through these submissions of 'Climate Change and Human Right Manifesto'.

Kanika Joshi, pursing her MA in Sustainable Development Practice (Batch of 2014-16) represented the Indian Delegation at the Conference of Youth (COY11) in Paris during November, 2015.

Mr. Akhil Sood did his MBA in Infrastructure from TU in 2014. He is now a successful entrepreneur and is the Founder of KARMABHOOMI, an open society that uses innovative ideas of Buddhist Economics and Karma-centric approaches to solve various socio-economic problems in villages of the country. They have successfully conducted solution-based development projects in places like Ladakh and Turtuk (J&K).

Mr. Rohit Sadaphal, Alumna of batch 2015, M. Tech Urban Development and Management programme, TERI University, now, Director, Econirmitee, which he started a year ago along with two alumni of the TERI University with an aim to help in solving waste management issues of the country, leaving jobs in elite companies. Typically an IT hub, Econirmitee, intends to bring in a culture of decentralized scientific waste processing units for local level waste management. It has started an impact-assessment of poor waste management in the Hinjewadi area of Pune. Econirmitee plans for the bio-methanation process of the waste i.e. recovering methane gas from organic waste. The segregation of the waste and processing will also be done. The focus areas of Econirmitee are construction and demolition areas of waste, floral waste, organic waste, landfill gas and carbon emissions from industries.


"On a late Sunday Evening.."

he persistence of overwhelming challenges of poverty, disease, climate change, and ecosystem vulnerability has been a cause for major concern to global society. The interwoven nature of these challenges, which spans across economic, socio-cultural, political and environmental realms, calls for skills sets that are attuned to complex nature of modernizing/modernized societies. The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) depict these inter linkages and has tried to set some common targets for na-

tions to achieve. Such multi-faceted nature of goals call for an integrated, cross-disciplinary training to understand the inadequacies of development processes and prepare for effective problem solving or policy management.

Systems thinking and interdisciplinary approach are some of the common frames to explore sustainable development and sustainability education. At TERI University, education for sustainable development is deeply rooted in all its programmes. The programmes connect socioeconomic, political and scientific aspects using innovative pedagogical tools to transcend conventional disciplinary structures and processes towards more holistic ways of thinking. One of the flagship programmes on sustainability practices at the TERI University is the Masters Programme in Sustainable Development Practice (MA-SDP). Starting in 2010, the Master's in Sustainable Development Practice seeks to address a critical gap in Sustainable Development education in regions where such capacity creation is required the most – South and Southeast Asia. The programme aims to develop an international cadre of development professionals, well equipped to tackle, beyond cultural boundaries and across sectoral divisions, the interwoven challenges faced by the world today. The uniqueness of the programme lies in its diversity and intensive practice element (field work) that prepares the students to appreciate and operate in multi-cultural environments.

While the 5th batch is all set to graduate very soon, it is an opportune time to take a look at the difference these sustainability practitioners are making in the society. Over a 100 alumni of the MA-SDP programme at TERI University, along with the faculty, are keen to organize a one-day interaction that not just brainstorms on the new skill sets for achieving sustainable development but also highlights the achievements of the alumni.

This one day event (titled Education for Sustainable Development: the practice connect) scheduled on the 9th of April will have two panels: first panel dealing with 'Practice challenges in the context of SDGs' (represented by NGO/INGO leaders) and second panel titled 'Walking the talk' that highlights the achievement of sustainability practitioners, especially the MA-SDP alumni from India, Nepal and Afghanistan. The keynote address will highlight on the increasing relevance of sustainability concerns in the context of higher education.


